These are the next 2 of our 8 scheduled Co-Builders. We have one final Co-Builder in May. That will complete our planned program. We hope you have enjoyed and will consider joining us next year.

Our March 2021 Co-Builder is:

“*Dogwood Needle Cover ala boutis provencal*” created by Marie Yolande.

A complete kit with fabric, yarn, needles, and directions for using the French embroidery technique called *boutis*. Donated by **Marlene Mehn**.

Delve into the past with “Mary Francis Sewing Book”, the girl’s story book which teaches sewing. A little girl is given a trunk of clothes, as well as the sewing materials. The *thimble people* teach her how to make a set of doll clothes using 15 basic hand sewing and embroidery stitches. There are instructions given for many sizes of dolls!!.. This copy is in its original casing. Never opened!.

Then there is a set (15) of notecards depicting sewing pictures from the Mary Francis Sewing book. (Also in its original casing-never opened)






April 8, 2021 - Fabric Weights (presented by Marlene Mehn)

Keeping our fingers crossed for an in person meeting.

Directions from Dawn to crochet the edges of blankets.

Row 1. Working from the wrong side, bring thread to the front through the first hole. Work a double crochet into the next hole.	
Work two chain stitches.	
Skip two holes. Work a double crochet through the fifth hole.	
Continue working two chain, double crochet into every third hole.	
Row 2. Turn the work. Work five treble stitches into the previous 2 chain space.	
Work a double crochet into the next 2 chain space.	
Repeat steps of working five treble stiches into the 2-chain space and double into the next chain space until end.	

Meet A Treasure – Marilyn (Lyn) Leet

Lyn was born in Bethesda, Maryland. She is married and is the mother of 4 children (2 boys and 2 girls) who have given her 8 grandchildren (4 boys and 4 girls) as well as one great grandson.

Lyn's mother started teaching her to sew when in elementary school. She continued that learning through a Home Economics courses in Junior and Senior High schools. During her first two years of college Lyn majored in Home Economics.



She found her way to smocking in the late 1970s taking classes in a small sewing store in the small Virginia town where she lived. Without a pleater in the shop, it was required that they send garments to another shop near Monticello to get them pleated. It was during this time that she started smocking for her daughters.

Lyn's education provided her with other sewing skills such as garment construction, general sewing, hand embroidery, and needlepoint. She also knows how to knit. She started a handmade quilt decades ago, the remains unfinished as other projects always seemed to take precedence leaving this one to wait until she had the time to finish the hand quilting. Many years ago, she did Ecclesiastical sewing for her church.

While perusing the SAGA website thinking about how she would like to smock again after so long a time, she decided to visit a local chapter and decided on Chesapeake Treasures. Her intent was to see if she could revive her skills while meeting and getting to know others who enjoyed sewing and needlework. Lyn would like to revive her smocking skills and is starting with Wee Care gowns. Lyn has many projects lined up to complete, one being a child's dress pattern once she feels more confident after reviving her sewing and smocking skills.

Lyn loves to spend time with family, as well as other outside interests. While the world is at a pause and we are waiting to spend more time with others, Lyn keeps herself busy with gardening, and cooking. Lyn was working until this past January when the pandemic stopped travel and her work stopped. She is hoping next year will be different and she can go back to work or perhaps find a new adventure. In the meantime, she has so many projects stacked up its hard to decide which one she should do to keep her hands and mind busy.


