

Bereavement/Memory Envelope

Below are a few adjustments Joyce made to the YouTube demo

- 1. Quilting the outer fabric is optional.
- 2. All seams are 1/4 "
- 3. Ignore making the pocket on lining fabric. Skip to 9:34 time on video.
- 4. After 14:51,(time on video) topstitch should be no more than 1/8".
- 5. If you have snaps you can put them on or leave them off. I will attach when returned.

That's all there is to these easy envelopes.

Wee Care Patchwork Blankets – from Joyce

One of the hospitals needed small blankets 18" x 18" or 30" square. They do not recommend bright colors for the blankets that would be used for NICU and live babies. I have been making the smaller size, using 5" squares (also called charm squares). I sew 4 of them across and 4 down. I put a backing on it – right sides together and sew around leaving an opening to turn. I like to use flannel – it's so soft and easy to work with. After I turn it right side out, I give it a quick press and then stitch around the edges and down and across the seams. You do not need to use batting with these little blankets.

You can make a larger blanket/quilt about 30" square. I've seen them done with two pieces of flannel sewn together and quilted in the same style as the small ones. You can crochet around the edges of the flannel blankets, bind the edges or serge the edges.

You can also knit or crochet baby blankets. There are lots of ideas out on YouTube and Pinterest.

Recipe for Peanut Butter Temptations from Pam Anthony (Lindsay Carroll's cousin)

½ cup smooth peanut butter

½ cup butter softened (1 stick)

½ cup sugar

½ cup light brown sugar

1 egg

½ teaspoon vanilla

1 1/4 cup flour

3/4 teaspoon baking soda

½ teaspoon salt

Candy options – mini Reeses Cups

Hersey Kisses, mini Snickers Bars

Cream butter and peanut butter; gradually add sugars and mix till light and fluffy.

Add egg and vanilla and mix well.

Add flour, baking soda and salt and mix.

Form dough into large ball, wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate for 1 hour or more.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease mini muffin tins.

Shape dough into 1" balls and place in mini muffin tins

Bake 12 -13 minutes; remove from oven and immediately press candy into baked cookie dough.

Cool completely before removing from muffin pan.

Store in airtight container in refrigerator.

We usually double this recipe. ENJOY!
