Silk Museum Lyon, France

While we were in Lyon, France, David and I took a tour of a silk museum called, La Maison Des Canuts. This is the place to visit for understanding the silk industry in Lyon, France.

“La Maison des Canuts “translates to, The House of Silk Weavers”

A “Canut” was a master weaver. Becoming a Canut required 10 years of training, five years learning from a master weaver and another five years being mentored. The canut worked for a merchant, called a

“soyeux” in French. The merchant passed orders to the canut and provided silk threads and the patterns to weave.

The Jacquard loom was invented by 1804 which simplified the weaving of patterns. In an eight-hour workshop shift, a Canut can weave 35 cm of pattern. So, on average it takes three days to complete a meter.

When the fabric and pattern are complete, the canut delivers the product to the merchant who pays the canut based on the work that was done.

The canut works off commission alone, and his pay depends on the difficulty of the pattern, technique, number of colors, and agreement with the soyeux, and the presence of mistakes. The canut is paid by the soyeux at the time of delivery. The canut never meets the customer only the soyeux.

In the year 1536, King Francis1st, granted the city, the privilege to weave “Noble” materials.

The canut workshop is the same place where they worked, lived, ate, and slept. The whole family worked and lived together in the workshop, along with any journeyman and apprentices.

Hand weaving is still practiced today, with two remaining workshops, still using Jacquard handlooms. They are in neighborhoods near the museum. They weave for cultural heritage, historical monuments, museums, and castles. They employ eight artisans, women and men between the ages of 30 to 60.

May will be the kick off of the next multi month program on **Fine Machine Sewing.**


June – **Spring Potluck** before our summer break – a host is needed!
